Student Satisfaction Survey Analysis Report 2019-2020

The survey was done on the students of all the three years of session 2019-2020 of all the faculties/courses – UG and PG of the college.

Out of total strength, 1293 responses were received in which the maximum response percentage was from B.Sc. (34.6%), B.A. (30.4%), B. Com (10.6%), and other courses (24.4%).

In year-wise responses, 2nd-year students responded maximum (43.6%) 3rd-year students responded22.2% and 1st year had a response of 34.2% to the survey.

The responses were as follows: -

- 1. Out of 1276 responses, about more than 94.3% of the students agreed that 70-100% of the syllabus was covered in the classes and 9% were agreed to 55 69%.
- 2. Out of 1276 responses, about 93.3% of the students agreed that teachers thoroughly and satisfactorily prepared for the class.
- 3. Out of 1276, about 83.9% of the students agreed that teachers can communicate with themeffectively and 12.4% found this just satisfactorily.
- 4. Out of 1281 responses, about 74.4% of students agreed that the teacher's approach to teaching is very good to excellent and 22.1 agreed to good.
- 5. Out of 1270 responses, 89.4% of students rated fairness in the internal evaluation process byteachers as quite fair and 8.3% rated sometimes unfair.
- 6. Out of 1278 responses, 80.3% of students agreed that their performance in assignments was discussed with them usually every time and 13.2% agreed to occasionally or sometimes.
- 7. Out of 1257 responses, about 65% of the students agreed that institution takes an active interest in promoting internship, student exchange, field visits for them often to regularly and 20.4% agreed to sometimes and 8.5% rated it rarely.
- 8. Out of 1265 responses, more than 77.7% of students agreed that the teaching and mentoring process in the institution facilitates them in cognitive, social, and emotional growth very well to significantly, while 16.3% rated it moderately.
- 9. Out of 1270 responses, 79.5% of the students agreed that the institution provides multipleopportunities to learn and grow and 16.6% were opted to neutral.
- 10. Out of 1267 responses, 82.7% of the students rated that teachers inform about expected competencies, course outcome and program outcome usually to every time and 11.7% rated itto occasionally/ sometimes.

- 11. Out of 1255 responses, 81.2% of the students feel that most of the time mentors do the necessary follow-up with the assigned tasks to them and 11.1% agreed to occasionally/ sometimes.
- 12. Out of 1261 responses, almost 88.5% of the students agreed that most of the time the teachersillustrate the concept through examples and applications and 8.3% rated it occasionally/ sometimes.
- 13. Out of 1257 responses, 81.6% of the students agreed that most of the teachers identify strengths of the students and encourage them by providing the right level of challenges while 10.3% agreed this statement to partially.
- 14. Out of 1265 responses, 78.8% of students believe that teachers are able to identify theirweaknesses and help them to overcome these most of the times and 11.7% believe to occasionally/ sometimes.
- 15. Out of 1246 responses, 37.7% of students agreed that the institution makes effort to engage students in the monitoring, review and continuous quality improvement of the teaching-learning process, while 29.9% were neutral and 13.2% have disagreed with the statement.
- 16. Out of 1250 responses, 76.6% of students agreed that the teachers in the institution use student-centric methods for enhancing teaching-learning experience great to a moderate extentand 11.7% agreed with somewhat and 9% were with very little.
- 17. Out of 1258 responses, 80.8% of students agreed with the opinion that teachers encourage them to participate in extracurricular activities and 13.8% were neutral.
- 18. Out of 1250 responses, 78% of students agreed that the efforts are made by teachers/institutions to inculcate soft skills, life skills, and employability skills to make them aready world of work great to moderate extent and 11.3% agreed with somewhat extent.
- 19. Out of 1251 responses, about 50.2% of students admitted that 70 to 90% of the teachers use ICTtools such as LCD, Projectors, multimedia, etc. while teaching and 18% admitted to 50 to 69%, 10.6% admitted to 30.49%, and 21.2% were with below 29%.
- 20. Out of 1261 responses, 85.4% of students agreed that the overall quality of training learning process in the institute is very good while 12.4% were neutral.

Suggestions Regarding Student Feedback to Improve the overall teaching-learning processFollowing suggestions were given by most of the students: -

- 1. Smart classes or tutorial classes should be introduced for all classes.
- 2. Feedback should be given after the assessment of project work, assessment, class test, ormidterm examinations.

- 3. Seminars, debates, group discussions, quizzes, and competition examinations should bearranged from time to time for students.
- 4. Communication skills, personality development, and language improvement short-termprograms should be organized.
- 5. Library, laboratories, hostels, common rooms, classrooms, and toilets should be properly sanitized.
- 6. Need of encouragement for active participation in curricular and co-curricular activities for theoverall development of the students.
- 7. Time should be increased for the library.
- 8. Class size should be limited and proper sitting arrangements and infrastructure (like lights and fans) should be there in class and library too.
- 9. Support staff should be increased in the library and the fee counter especially.
- 10. Regulation of regular water supply for drinking and sanitization.
- 11. Canteen can be improved by enhancing capacity and providing quality eatable items.
- 12. Need for placement programs for students in various courses.
- 13. Need of an auditorium.
- 14. Need to incorporate tutorial classes for weak students in every subject.

15. Industrial learning programs, interactive programs, educational tours, and excursions forstudent sensitization.
